



1 | COURT CASE STATUS: How Do I Find Out My Immigration Court Hearing Date?

I. Notice to Appear (NTA)

After you entered the United States, you may have been given or mailed a document called a “Notice to Appear”.

Review your Notice to Appear and determine if any of your personal information is incorrect.

You should still **check your case status** to confirm the most up-to-date court hearing information.



Remember, if you miss your court hearing, an Immigration Judge can enter a removal order, which means you could be removed from the United States.

II. 3 Ways to Check Your Case Status

OPTION 1: ICE PORTAL

1. Go to: <https://portal.ice.gov/eoir>
2. To change the language, click the box in the upper right corner and select your language.
3. Click the first box and enter your A number.
4. Click the second box and enter your First Name.
5. Click the third box and enter your Last Name.
6. Click the fourth box and enter your Country of Birth.
7. Complete the CAPTCHA by clicking "I'm not a robot."
 - a. If a window with pictures appears, follow the directions, click on the correct pictures, and click "Next".
 - b. When you have completed following the instructions, click "Verify".
8. Click "Search".





OPTION 2: EOIR AUTOMATED CASE INFORMATION WEBSITE

1. Go to: <https://acis.eoir.justice.gov/en/>
2. A disclaimer window will appear. If you agree with the terms, click the "I accept" button.
3. To change the language of the website into another language, click the down arrow on the upper right corner and select your language.
4. Click the first box and enter your A number.
5. Click "Submit".

OPTION 3: EOIR AUTOMATED HOTLINE: 1-800-898-7180

The hotline is only available in English and Spanish. If you do not understand one of these languages, you should check your case status online (See Option 2 above).

Before you call, make sure you have (1) a pen and paper to write down your information, and (2) your A number.

Instructions:

- To hear the information in English, press 1; for Spanish, press 2.
- The system will instruct you to enter your A number using the keypad on your phone.
- Then, the system will repeat the A number that you entered. If the A number is correct, press 1. To re-enter the A number, press 2.

How do I know if my case has started with the immigration court?	When you call the EOIR Automated Hotline, it will say, " <i>The A number information you entered does not match a record in the system or the case has not been filed with an immigration court</i> ".	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• If the A number is correct and the system spells out your name, your case is in the system.• If the name is generally correct, <u>press 1 to confirm</u>. If you do not recognize the name, press 2 to re-enter your A number. The system will read the date your case in immigration court started.• To hear your next hearing date, <u>press 1</u>. The system will read the date and time of the hearing, and then the address of the court where your hearing will be.• Next, you can <u>press 3</u> to hear the status of your case. If the case is currently in immigration court, the system will say "your case is currently pending."
What should I do?	Make sure you entered the correct A number and try again.	Attend the immigration court hearing listed on your court case status.
